THE PRIME MINISTER DR. MANMOHAN SINGH MEETS THE SILVER JUBILEE BATCH

The Prime Minister, the students of the silver Jubilee batch of Dev Samaj College of Education, the banquet hall, the modesty of the elected head of the state created history of sorts on the early afternoon of 28th September, 2006 when Dev Samaj college of education became the first college of Education of Punjab University to be honored with an audience with the Prime Minister **Dr Manmohan Singh**. The College students had also met the **President Shri APJ Kalam** in December 2005.

Dr Mrs. Satinder Dhillon, Principal and members of staff headed the delegation of the students. Dr Mrs. Satinder Dhillon said that as a part of

the ongoing silver Jubilee celebrations, the college had taken this initiative for the Silver Jubilee batch. The privilege bestowed upon us by the Prime Minister was an acknowledgement of the work the college had been doing for this region for past 25 years. The visit became more profound as the theme for the Silver Jubilee year is Assurance of Quality in Teacher Education.

The Prime Minister appreciated and acknowledged the rich values and traditions of Dev Samaj and congratulated Dr Mrs. Satinder Dhillon, Principal for carrying on and preserving the legacy of Dev Samaj.

In a 15 minutes interactive session with the future teachers of Dev Samaj College of Education, the Prime Minister Dr Manmohan Singh answered many of the prospective teacher's questions.

By referring to his experiences as a teacher and an economist, he addressed the prospective teachers to acquire this profession with utmost sanctity and work for the social welfare as a whole. He called himself an 'Accidental politician' and recalled his teaching days as the happiest and creative time of his life.

Expressing his views regarding the rising expense of higher education, he said that the fee structure is adequately proportional to the facilities provided to the students. In the context, the universities are adding more and more to their infrastructure for ensuring better education to the youth.

And when asked for tips of being a good teacher, he said that selfanalysis, reflection, integrity and commitment towards the profession were the basis of becoming an effective teacher. He further suggested, teacher should be both respectful and respectable as they are the nation builders. When asked to recall and share his experiences as student, The Prime Minister charmed the prospective teachers by saying all his days as students here in Punjab University and abroad had been wonderful and enriching.

The ordinariness of this **extraordinary person** is what the prospective teachers carried back home. The delegation was totally immersed in Prime Minister's humbleness, brilliance, intelligibility, unassuming persona, and his profound and insightful words have now become the mantra of this Sliver Jubilee batch, the words which no doubt would inspire the future teachers to **teach the future**.

SMT TARA GANDHI, GRAND DAUGHTER OF MAHATMA GANDHI ADDRESSED THE STUDENTS

It was proud privilege of the institute and a great honour to have Smt Tara Gandhi, granddaughter of Mahatma Gandhi address the student's .In her brilliant discourse of 30 minutes she reminisced the time she spent with her grand father, and her father the youngest son of Gandhi ji. She shared with the audience a few incidents of her life with Gandhi Ji and Kasturba Gandhi. Smt Tara Gandhi mesmerized the gathering with her charm and words.

JOINT ADMISSION FOR B.ED FOR THE THREE UNIVERSITIES

It was our proud privilege when in our silver jubilee year **Dr Satinder Dhillon was appointed the coordinator for the joint counselling admission for B. Ed for 2006** – **2007**, **hosted by the Punjab University**, **the three universities for Punjab University** (41), Guru **Nanak Dev** (33) and **Punjabi University** (41) for 114 colleges. The total number of students admitted was around 15000. The college staff along

with the staff from Government College of Education and Punjab University made this counseling possible and a success. The college had been a host Joint admission in 1999 – 2000, 2000 – 2001 and 2005-2006

PRODUCTIVE LEARNING EDUCATION BEYOND THE ORDINARY - DISTINGUISHED LECTURE SERIES AND VISITORS PROGRAM

As part of the on going Silver Jubilee Celebrations of Dev Samaj College of Education, Dr Mrs. Satinder Dhillon initiated a proactive forum where distinguished International & national visitors visited and interacted with the students & faculty.

The distinguished *Lecture Series* - a forum for high-level regional, national and international leaders and policy makers to share their knowledge and perspectives on issues related to education. Eminent speakers and leaders who approach education from a diverse range of perspectives, delivered lectures and discussions throughout the Silver Jubilee year under this forum. This dynamic forum aimed at providing scholarly and intellectually engaging opportunities for prospective teachers. The Lectures spanned a wide range of topics and subject areas, and they were intended to promote life-long learning by teachers at all the levels.

The Silver Jubilee distinguished visitors & speakers for the academic year 2006 – 2007 ranged from eminent educationist to visiting dignitaries from South Asia and Europe.

Distinguished visitor for the Month of August 2006 – Ms. Gulmina Bilal, Islamabad, Pakistan

As part of the on going initiative of DEV SAMAJ COLLEGE OF EDUCATION of "Working Together To Build A Community Of Responsive South Asian Educators" Ms. Gulmina Bilal from Islamabad, Pakistan visited the college and interacted with the members of the staff. The meeting was attended by staff members of the Dev Samaj College and chaired by Dr Mrs. Satinder Dhillon, Principal stated that education in South Asia can contribute conducively towards creating a culture of peace. She stated that such interactions and initiatives aimed at the need of intellectual interaction of the education faculty and civil society of both nations to provide a congenial platform and facilitative environment for collaborative work assignments for walking towards an enhanced future.

Ms. Gulmina Bilal while sharing the views with the members of the staff stated that the visit had reiterated `my faith in education that presents a broader worldview and does not rely on ethnocentricity as imperative for peace initiatives to become a process between the two countries. "She stated that the inevitable economic interdependence has to be substantiated with positive interactions and deliberations in education amongst change agents and multipliers. She declared that in her view the Dev Samaj College of Education consists of individuals who are responsive to the students & society's needs. They do not consist of teachers who blindly teach to an increasingly lost society about increasingly lost times.

Ms. Bilal appreciated the efforts, which are being made to promote the ownership for the peace process within the faculty of education and

create a network of Indian and Pakistan educators. Ms. Bilal designed a number of political advocacy campaigns and also penned a report documenting the experience of women parliamentarians titled, "Women Parliamentarians: Swimming against the tide" She also prepared a documentary that traced the political contribution of Pakistani women titled, "the journey of Pakistani women through politics."

Distinguished Speaker for the Month of October 2006 – Dr Gunther Rautz, EURAC, Bolzano, Itlay

The distinguished speaker for the month of October was Mr. Gunther Rautz, researcher, EURAC Research, Italy who spoke on Minorities in European Union. In his presentation Mr.Gunther, highlighted the minorities in European Union as said that in the absence of a concrete definition of "minority", it is taken as a community that differs from majority with respect to language, culture, sex ratio etc. This minority is deprived of legal identification, rights and privileges enjoyed by all. He highlighted the work being done in Europe for the fulfillment of a vision to bring about democracy and eroding the very concept of class discrimination.

Mr Rautz also presented the 'South Tyrol' model of solving internal conflict in northern Italy. Similarities regarding possibilities of solving Kashmir problem were drawn and were illustrated with examples. Various examples were citied of working towards political autonomies, political segregation and integration.

In his conclusion Mr.Gunther asked the students of Dev Samaj College to help in the phase of confidence building while working as the teachers of tomorrow. This will go a long way in constructing a society free of the evil of class discrimination. The lecture was followed by a question answer session.

Distinguished Visitors for the Month of October 2006 – Team of Teachers, Rotherham County, Yorkshire, United Kingdom

In the ongoing Silver Jubilee celebrations Dev Samaj College of Education, hosted a team of eleven teachers under the Teachers International Professional Development Program from Rotherham County, Yorkshire, United Kingdom. This project is collaborative effort of Department of Education and Skills U.K. and Art and education Institute, Mohali, to explore understand and do creative work in each other s country. The team was headed by Mr. Mick Connell, School Improvement Advisor, Rotherham, U.K. and accompanied by Prof. Rajpal, Director, Heritage Institute for Art, Culture and Education.

The team visited the actual classrooms and observed simulated teaching done by pupil teachers of the college. The sessions were followed by interaction amongst the visitors and the prospective teachers. The delegates while interacting appreciated the emphasis the college has on sensitizing and inculcating the values among prospective teachers. They specially appreciated the respect the students have for their teachers.

Distinguished Speaker for the Month of November 2006 – Dr S.P. Udaykumar

Dr S.P. Udayakumar, a scholar of International repute who has facilitated workshops at Gandhi and Nonviolent Revolution, South Asian Languages and Cultures, UMN, MN. USA, IS AN Adjunct Faculty at World Politics, Dept. of Political Science, Hamline University, MN and at Conflict Resolution, Human Rights, Globalization, at Governor's School, Monmouth University, NJ. USA was the distinguished speaker for the

month of November.

Dr S.P. UdayKumar began with a brief introduction of the concepts of political culture and civilizations and how our political self affects the former. He elaborated on how our perceptions are the result of our assumptions, how assumptions are shaped by the values and how values are inculcated by the society.

He explained with examples how textbooks in the past and present have been used in the past to present historical events in the manipulated manner to present historical events in the manipulated manner to attain political gain and power, he was of view that textbooks hide and highlights add and avoid so as to present event in particular manner for political gain.

Later, Dr Udayakumar emphasized upon the role of teacher in creating democratic and secular environment for the youngsters along with on the need of right kind of textbooks presenting the critical aspects of the matter.

Distinguished Visitor for the Month of April, 2007 – Interaction with Ms. Erica Funkhouser

As part of ongoing 'Campaign for Peace-city Chandigarh', Peace Club of the college in association with YUVSATTA & American Centre organised an interaction of Poetess Ms. Erica Funkhouser with College staff and students. Apart from reading some of her poems, Ms. Erica, a teacher of introductory and advanced Poetry writing at MIT, in USA interacted with participants on War Poetry from World War-I through the Present Iraq War.

Ms. Erica's poems have appeared in The New Yorker, The Atlantic, Ploughshares, The Paris Review, Poetry and other magazines and anthologies; one of her poems has been sand-blasted into the wall of the Davis Square MBTA Station in Somerville, MA, USA. Educated at Stanford University, she was honoured as a Literary Light by The Boston Public Library in 2002 and is a 2007 recipient of a Guggenheim Fellowship.

Ms Erica Funkhouser read out some poems of eminent poets like Dulce Et Decorum Est by Wilfred Owen, The Naming of Parts by Henry Reed, Elegy for a Cove Full of Bones by John Ciardi, A Bummer by Yusef Komunyakaa and Two Stories Down by Brian Turner. The main purpose of reading these poems is to the message of peace by highlighting the horror effects of war that are depicted vividly in these poems. Poetry is the medium through which facts of war can be expressed.

EDUCATIONAL ADVANCEMENT

Though all activities and programs aim at Educational Advancement but some specific programs were held in the Silver Jubilee year to promote educational achievements.

LECTURE ON AWARENESS ABOUT FAMILY PLANNING METHODS IN ADOLESCENTS ALONG WITH TEENAGE PREGNANCY

was Dr. K.C. Dubey, Director Akashwani and was attended by various known personalities, critics and experts.

ANNUAL EDUCATIONAL TRIP

Annual Educational trip was organized to the Pink City Jaipur in second week of March. The trip is planned and arranged by the prospective teachers themselves so as to train them in this important aspect of teaching.

OZONE LAYER PRESERVATION DAY

Ozone layer preservation day was celebrated on 16th September 2006. Dr Indu Rihani, Principal Rayat & Bahara College of Education was the chief guest. The main objective of the celebrations attended by the students and the faculty was to create awareness amongst prospective teachers regarding the depletion of Ozone layer that protects us from harmful rays of the sun. 3. INNOVATIONS IN CURRICULAR DESIGN AND TRANSACTION:

This year we attempted to bring uniformity in the curriculum design of the three universities of the region.

Two Day Workshop on Uniformity In B.Ed Syllabus In Three Universities

The college has the honour of organising a two day workshop on "Uniformity in B.Ed syllabus in three universities namely Panjab University, Chandigarh, Punjabi University, Patiala and Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar was held on 20th 21st April, 2007 as per the instructions of DPI colleges ,Punjab. The main purpose of the workshop in to bring uniformity in the Bed syllabus in all the three universities so that students should not suffer if they go migrate from one university to another. The principals and experts from all the three universities attended the workshop.

Dr. Kanwarjit Singh, DPI Colleges, Punjab inaugurated the workshop. Dr.J.N. Joshi, Chairman, Jan Shikshan Sansthan & an Eminent Educationist, Dr. Raj Gupta. Chairperson, Department of Education, Panjab University and Dr. J. S. Dhillon, Dean Faculty of Education, Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar were also invited in the workshop to contribute in revising the Bed curriculum.

Dr. (Mrs) Satinder Dhillon, Principal of the college, welcomed all the delegates from the three universities. In the introductory speech, she emphasized the uniformity in Bed syllabus of the three universities which will be of great benefit for the students, as the students suffer a lot when they migrate from one university to another. In the inaugural session, Prof. Joshi while addressing the participants highlighted on the need to have a fresh look on quality of education. He also said that quality

education is must for a society to progress. Certain teaching skills are the pre requisites for good teachers and these should be included in Bed Curriculum. Dr. Kanwarjit Singh during his brief talk stressed that the Criteria for evaluation regarding internal as well as external assessment should have uniformity so that candidate may not face any discrimination during the time of placement.

4.INTER-DISCIPLINARY PROGRAMMES STARTED:

Various subjects proliferate under one major discipline EDUCATION in the college and some of the inter-disciplinary programmes started this year were:

CAPACITY BUILDING

One of the main objectives every year is to take the prospective teachers through a process of equipping them with the understanding and skills and access to information, knowledge and training enabling them to perform effectively in the teaching profession. This process not only enables them to build their own capacities but also the management of relationships between the different organizations and stakeholders of education. Through the activities organized for the prospective teachers it is intended to build their capacities enabling them to be empowered teacher. This year we worked along these following lines:

NATIONAL INTEGRATION WEEK

The NATIONAL INTEGRATION WEEK was celebrated in the college vicinity; the theme for today was "weaker section of the society". The students of M.ED threw light on the various aspects of socially, culturally and economically deprived sections of the society.

LECTURE ON MICRO SKILLS

A lecture on various Micro Skills was delivered by Shri O.P. Chawdhry, from DAV college of Education, Abhor to introduce the students regarding all the various micro skills namely skill of stimulation variation, skill of introducing a lesson, skill of fluency in questioning, skill of black board writing and skill of illustrating with examples. The lecture ended with an interactive question and answer session.

5.EXAMINATION REFORMS IMPLEMENTED:

- 1. Every year the college conducts two house tests every year, one in the month of January and other in April. They are based on external examination pattern. It is compulsory to appear in both the tests and 20 marks internal assessment is based on the basis of performance of house tests, class tests and assignments in each paper.
- 2. It is compulsory for every student to get a minimum of 40% marks in each of the house tests. The students are informed about this right in the beginning of the session and as such this is informed in the college prospectus.
- 3. There is a fair degree of seriousness among the students about the system of examination.
- 4. The students who don't secure required marks are given another chance in exceptional circumstances. Any student, who fails to appear in any of the examination papers, for whatever reason, are not entitled to annual academic prize.
- 5. Apart from the house exams, snap tests are a regular feature of the college.

- 6. The system of evaluation is continuous and comprehensive. Formative and summative evaluation forms integral part of evaluation.
- 7. Remedial classes are arranged for the students who poorly perform in house tests.
- 8. The evaluation method is communicated to the students at the beginning of the year, the details of which are given in the prospectus also.
- 9. At least 75% attendance is essential to appear in the annual examination and the students having more than 75% are given weight age in internal assessment.
- 10.Internal assessment of the students is done every month on the basis of class test/ house test and participation in co-curricular activities.
- 11. As a result, each and every student gets due recognition and they get motivated to participate and perform well to in pursuit of excellence.

6. CANDIDATES QUALIFIED: NET/SLET/GATE ETC.

The year saw exceptional results as many of our students cleared their UGC- NET exam in Education. This is itself an indicative of the quality education in Dev Samaj College of Education. Dr Joyti Khanna and Dr Batani Devi, the NSS Program officers introduced the chief guest and the other guests. The program officers also shared with audience the aims and objectives of the NSS units of the College. They also shared its services to the community for the last 25 years by serving people from all walks of life. Various other competitions were also held on the theme of World literacy Day that included Poster making, Slogan writing, Collage Making and Poetry recitation.

BLOOD DONATION MOTIVATION CAMP

Safe blood donation youth motivation camp was organized by Blood Bank Society, Sec-37, on September 26th -27th 2006 for all the students of

the college. Dr. Satinder Dhillon, Principal Dev Samaj College also motivated the students to participate in the noble cause as she herself has donated blood more than 50 times. Mrs. Vineta Sahni encouraged volunteers, directed and autonomous donors and discouraged professionals and replacement donors.

Blood Donation Camp was held on the occasion of womans day on March 8th 2007. Students as well as faculty members of the college donated blood.

10-DAY NSS CAMP AT VILLAGE DADU MAJRA

DAY 1: The 10 day camp of The National Service Scheme was inaugurated on 30 November 2006 by chief guest Dr. M. S. Bains Director, NSS, Panjab University, Chandigarh. The program was attended by Kumari Satyawati ji, Chairperson, Dr Mrs. Satinder Dhillon, Principal, Mrs. Sarita Mehta, an eminent poetess and the faculty members and all the 200 volunteers of NSS unit of the college. The 10 day camp was held in village Dadu Majra.

Dr Jyoti Khanna and Dr. (Mrs.) Batani Devi program officers, briefed the NSS volunteers regarding the 10-day NSS camp, which was held at Dadu majra, savera, and Blind institute.

DAY 2: On the occasion of Worlds AIDS Day a rally was organized and was flagged by the principal of the college, Dr Mrs Satinder Dhillon and all the staff members of the college present. The procession carried out around the entire village and pamphlets distributed and slogans raised like

"aids da gyan bachave sadi jaan" ,"dev samaj ka nara hal aids ko mit ana hal".

People enthusiastically participated in the rally and asked questions without any hesitation. An additional programme was also started and students who needed help are identified. The day ended at 5 pm after the survey of the village completed.

DAY 3: On the third day of NSS Camp World Disabled Diwas was celebrated in Dadu Majra village. Villagers were given instructions on how to handle, take care and motivate the disabled to be independent. The students approached the disabled in the families, interacted with them and motivated them to lead a better life. The family members were also informed about the various institutions and areas that could be of good help to them when needed. Extra help was provided to the children of the village and a number of extra curricular activities were done such was teaching them the application of heena, Punjabi folk dance and other forms of dance. Education was also provided to the uneducated adults and their problems were closely observed. The college also organized a free vaccination camp and a number of stray as well as pet do were given required vaccination.

DAY 4: The theme of the day was to preserve environment. The day started with the Morning Prayer followed by the national anthem. The NSS volunteers went door to door to create awareness among the residents to keep their environment clean and healthy. The students also cleaned the lanes of the village with the help of the municipality people. Dustbins were placed at convenient places and people were asked to throw their waste in the dustbins. The use of paper bags instead of polythene bags was also propagated. At 12 0 clock a rally was flagged by

the staff members of the college and the volunteers along with the children of Dadu Majra village raised slogans for environment protection like "per lagao prayavaran bachao", "each one plant one", "dev samaj ka nara hai, pryavaran bachan hai". After lunch a tree plantation drive was done in which a number of villagers enthusiastically participated and trees were planted. The young children were given awareness about the importance of trees and were also motivated to plant trees. They were made to pledge that they will join hands to make their environment pollution free.

DAY 5: On the fifth day of the NSS Camp International Volunteers Day was celebrated in Dadu Majra village. Villagers were given knowledge about vocational courses and women were encouraged to contribute in the family income by stitching, knitting, embroidery etc. Educated people were asked to give tuitions to the needy children which would help them make some money as well as help the children in their studies. The theme of the day was motivating people to donate blood. Myths regarding the blood donation were cleared by the students and people were encouraged to donate blood. Students of the college went door to door and noted down the names of the people interested in donating blood. A rally regarding Blood Donation was flagged by Mrs Suman Malik, Principal of Government High School Dadu Majra. The rally was carried on throughout the village and a number of enthusiastic villagers joined the rally. A number of school children also voluntarily participated in the rally and slogans "rakt daan, maha daan", "donate blood save lives", "blood donors are silent heroes" were raised. Volunteers also helped the students who needed extra coaching and guidance in studies.

DAY 6: On sixth day of the NSS Camp the theme of the day was "Live Healthy Life". Dr. Veena Gupta, a doctor and an eminent social worker

firstly explained the importance of healthy life. She stressed that to be healthy means not only physically but mentally, socially and spiritually healthy. She encouraged the NSS Volunteers to go door to door and propagate natal, prenatal and post natal test. In prenatal check ups, pregnant women should be convinced to visit their doctor regularly and strictly follow his instructions. For natal care villagers should be encouraged to go to hospitals for delivery she also encouraged the volunteers to inform villagers about proper vaccination to protect children from various diseases and personal hygiene.

DAY 7: A lecture for motivating blood donation was organized by Blood Bank Society, Sector -37, Chandigarh. Mrs Dane Walia and Mrs Bhupinder Banta Singh encouraged volunteers to donate blood.

Volunteers also encouraged people to donate blood and cleared many myths regarding blood donation. People above the age of eighteen years were asked to donate blood at least twice a year.

DAY 8: Volunteers were dispersed into groups and spread door to door awareness about personal hygiene (clean toilets, proper disposal of garbage, clean water for cooking and drinking etc), AIDS and various precautions to be taken to live a healthy life. Villagers were also taught various skills like application of Mehandi, Stitching, Flower Making, Knitting etc by the volunteers of NSS. They were also updated with various vocational courses available, so that they utilize their time in optimum way. The children were given extra coaching by NSS volunteers not only related to curriculum but extra curricular activities were also encouraged.

DAY 9: The day started with the morning prayer followed by national anthem in Dadu Majra Stadium. The theme of the day was throwing light

on the aims and objectives of NSS. Dr. Shankar Pirnja, Department of Community Medicine, P.G.I, Chandigarh., an eminent professional delivered a lecture on health education and problem of adolescence. He also highlighted the role of teacher in the development of a child and how a teacher can help the child during this stage or phase of life. Dr. S. K. Sahni, Deputy Programme Advisor, Chandigarh, expressed his views how NSS is awaking the laymen as well as the one who is imparting knowledge to them. He said if we want the over all development of a nation, the development of the remotest area becomes mandatory and it is only possible if each and every person participates and contributes in his best efforts. NSS volunteers with the help of the villagers organized cultural items like dance, skit, poem recitation, giddha, drama etc. The programme highlighted the various projects undertaken as a part of the ten days NSS camp.

DAY 10: The valedictory function of the 10-day NSS camp was held in the college campus. Dr. M. S. Bains, coordinator, NSS Punjab University and Kumari Satyawati ji Chairman, Dev Samaj College Of Education were special guests on the occasion. Dr. Bains in his key note address encouraged the students to take part in all the activities. The report of vthe whole camp was presented in which it was mentioned that the base camp was organized in Dadu Majra and simultaneously students provided services at the Blind Institute Sector 26 and Savera in Sector 43. In the Blind school the students were taught about personal hygiene and in the Savera Camp the students were taught different skills.

Camp at Savera

SAVERA, an institute for young and poor girls located in sector 43, Chandigarh provides shelter, school education along with the training of basic skills, so to make them confident and self-reliant. During 10-day N.S.S. Camp, Painting classes were held everyday which includes versatile activities like Decorating Statues, Pots, Paper Bags, Shagun Cards, and Greetings Cards etc. The idea behind creation of such items was to provide some financial security as they could sell these items and can earn something for their living. The volunteers cooked delicious dishes daily at the institute for the students and staff members.

The volunteers also taught them the basic technique of food preservation and the art of making pickles and chutneys. Beside this teaching session was carried out daily. Art of Mehndi applying, art and craft work 'macramé' was also taught to the students. Exhibition-cum-sale of items was also organized on the concluding day. The NSS volunteers presented a cultural programme on the last day to mark the successful completion of the 10-day NSS camp.

Camp at Institute for Blind

Nearly 29 volunteers under the guidance of Mrs. Dev Sarita Rani and Dr. (Mrs.) Urmila Sharma worked in every nook and corner of the institute, be it assisting in kitchen, cleaning up and laying down of the dining room or dining table, working and stitching on sewing machines, stitching napkins or working in store rooms. The student volunteers helped the visually impaired students by recording lessons in audiocassettes and helping them in different subjects like arithmetic, geometry, science, biology and English were covered. The volunteers also visited the weaving and canning room to see the working and understanding how the apparatus functioned.

Many students handled the charkha and enjoyed being transported to the Gandhian Era. The student gifted a self-made mural aquarium painting to the institute as a token of respect to the students of the institute. Cultural programme was also organized in collaboration with students of the institute, which includes poem recitation, a western song performance, parody song and shared jokes. Mr K.R. Sood, (Principal) Institute for blind was the chief guest for the occasion.

19. COURSES IN WHICH STUDENT ASSESSMENT OF TEACHERS IS INTRODUCED AND THE ACTION TAKEN ON STUDENT FEEDBACK:

The college takes feedback of the teachers, their way of teaching and the facilities and infrastructure for teaching. The suggestions given by the students are thus implemented.

20. UNIT COST OF EDUCATION:

Our college is an aided college and the fee charged by the students is strictly according to Panjab University norms. Neither donations nor any extra charges are taken from the students. The detailed fee structure for 2006-07, as mentioned in the college prospectus has been annexured (Annexure-1).

21. COMPUTERIZATION OF ADMINISTRATION AND THE PROCESS OF ADMISSIONS AND EXAMINATION RESULTS, ISSUE OF CERTIFICATES:

The process of admitting students to these programs is by a transparent and well administered mechanism, complying with all educational norms of the Government. The process is fully computerised.

The admission in B.Ed and M.Ed is through Entrance Test which is of 75 marks and the qualifying marks for the General category students are 30% and those belonging to reserved categories are 25%.

CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION:

1. The admission to B.Ed. Course in the affiliated colleges of the P.U. situated in U.T. (Chandigarh) is made on the basis of the relative merit of the candidates in the Entrance Test, subject to the availability of seats in a

particular subject combination and such reservations as prescribed in the Rules of the U.T. Administration / P.U., Chandigarh.

2. The candidates are admitted to the college on **merit obtained subject wise** provided he/she fulfils the requisite eligibility conditions of the Panjab University.

The cut-off merit list for various subjects is displayed on the computer screens which can be seen by the students.

PROCEDURE FOR ADMISSION:

- a) After the result of the Entrance Test has been declared, all eligible candidates are called for interview
- b) The admission to Colleges of Education situated in U.T., Chandigarh is done strictly as per the N.C.T.E. norms by the Admission Committee constituted by the Vice-Chancellor, Panjab University.
- c) The dates for interview are notified in the leading dailies of the region.

Interview schedule for counselling is notified separately by the Panjab University, Chandigarh in the leading Newspapers.

- ➤ The application for the fee concession should be made at the time of admission form. No such application will be entertained later on. The income certificate of parents should be duly certified by the concerned authority along with an affidavit.
- ➤ The application for the fee concession is interviewed by the Fee Concession on the notified dates.
- Fee Concession, stipends and scholarships of all the categories are liable to be withdrawn, if the student shows deterioration in studies/remains irregular in attendance or is found guilty of misbehaviour.
