Independence Day

The co curricular activities organized this year started with a week long talent search wherein all the prospective students exhibited their aptitude and flair in performing arts and other literary activities.

Teacher’s Day Celebrations

Teacher’s day celebration started with much fan fare and a serious thought for the education focusing mainly on the qualities of a good teacher. A cultural program was presented by the new batch of prospective teachers.

World Literacy Day Celebrations

World Literacy Day was celebrated on 8th September 2007 to highlight the importance of literacy to individuals, communities and societies. Competitions were held on the theme of World literacy Day that included Poster making, Slogan writing, Collage Making and Poetry recitation.

Celebration of Hindi Diwas

Hindi Day was celebrated on 14th September 2007, to highlight the importance of our National language. On this occasion essay writing and poem writing competition on the theme of “Hindi aur Rashtrya Ekta” was held. 2. NEW ACADEMIC PROGRAMMES INITIATED (UG AND PG):

Since the college is a single-faculty (Education) professional institution, it runs courses like B.Ed, M.Ed and Post Graduate Diploma in Guidance and Counselling. In the previous session the college started the Post Graduate Diploma in Guidance and Counselling course. During this session no new courses were added, however the emphasis was on strengthening and bringing quality in the existing courses.

3. INNOVATIONS IN CURRICULAR DESIGN AND TRANSACTION:

5. EXAMINATION REFORMS IMPLEMENTED:

The college is affiliated to Panjab University, and the norms for the examination system are strictly in accordance. The college conducts two house tests every year and the students are judged in academics on that basis. Apart from them snap tests are also conducted for better preparation of the students. The system of evaluation is continuous and comprehensive. This year the following reforms in the present examination system were implemented:

1. The examination and assessment system was made more transparent by displaying the Internal Assessment sheets on the notice boards which were accessible to the students.
2. Remedial classes are arranged for the students who poorly perform in house tests.

10-Day NSS Camp at Village Butrela

19. UNIT COST OF EDUCATION:

Our college is an aided college and the fee charged by the students is strictly according to Panjab University norms. The detailed fee structure for 2007-08, as mentioned in the college prospectus has been annexured (Annexure-1).

20. COMPUTERIZATION OF ADMINISTRATION AND THE PROCESS OF ADMISSIONS AND EXAMINATION RESULTS, ISSUE OF CERTIFICATES:

The admission process is centralised and totally computerised. Eligibility criteria are according to the norms of Panjab University. The process of admitting students to these programs is by a transparent and well administered mechanism, complying with all educational norms of the Government. The process is fully computerised.

21. INCREASE IN THE INFRASTRUCTURAL FACILITIES:

In the session 2007-08, there was a no major change in the infrastructure facilities.

22. TECHNOLOGY UPGRADATION:

Although technology upgradation remains on the forefront of the college, this year the following changes were made in this regard:

1. New Over-head projector was added for M.Ed.
2. The LCD projector was permanently fixed in the college hall, where teachers taught through multimedia.
3. All the students of the college were oriented in computers and its functioning through INTEL course.

23. COMPUTER AND INTERNET ACCESS AND TRAINING TO TEACHERS AND STUDENTS:

This year saw a major change, as far as the internet access to the teachers and students is concerned as the college goes Vi-Fi and it became very convenient for the teachers to utilise internet for improving their teaching.

24. FINANCIAL AID TO STUDENTS:

The students were given scholarships and fee concessions on the basis of certain criteria, these are:

- 1) The priority is given to those students, who come from poor socio-economic background and can not thus afford college fee. They are given fee concessions, their uniforms are sponsored and books from the book bank are provided for the whole session. Occasionally their fee is taken care off by the college staff.
- 2) Meritorious students are provided scholarships as per college rules.

31. ACTIVITIES OF THE GUIDANCE AND COUNSELLING UNIT:

Guidance & Counselling Cell of the College

Guidance and Counselling cannot be completely separated from general life of any institution. It is joint venture requiring close co-ordination and co-operation between all the faculties of the institution. The college has a guidance cell which functions actively throughout the session and conducts various activities. Counselling is provided at personal level as well as vocational level. Psychological tests and instruments are available for the study of the development of the learner in the B.Ed. course and advanced educational psychology in M.Ed. course.

1. Providing educational guidance to students

- To identify special learners such as creative and gifted and cater to their needs and development.
- To monitor the academic progress of students studying in the institute
- To identify weak students, diagnose their learning difficulties and organize remedial measures.
- To enable students to get an insight into their potentialities, strengths and weaknesses for learning.
- To assist students in getting information about further education and training.

2. Providing vocational guidance

- To collect and disseminate information about job opportunities to students.
- To assist students to develop ability to analyze occupational information and make appropriate occupational choice.

- To provide information to students about self employment opportunities.

3. Providing personal and social guidance and counselling

- To identify students who have problems of adjustment and help them resolve the same.
- To assist in developing interpersonal relationships among students.
- To assist students in maintaining sound mental health.

Activities of the Guidance & Counselling Cell in 2007-08

In order to achieve the objectives mentioned above, the following tasks were taken by guidance and counselling centre.

- Organizing group guidance program: - Group guidance programme have been organized time to time to provide them necessary information. Specific educational guidance lectures are held introducing them to further options in education mainly B.Ed., M.Ed., and PG Diploma in G&C, U.G.C. (NET) and Ph.D. etc.
- Organizing Counselling sessions for resolving personal, emotional and social problems of students. The cell has an able and qualified counsellor. The counselling sessions take place after the regular classes are over.
- Monitoring activities of parent teachers and Alumni associations:- The cell has a close contact with the placement cell. The old students are placed with the help of placement cell of the college. They are guided regarding the job opportunities both in Govt. and private sectors.
